1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

Introduction: Standard feedbacks are received mainly from students and parents for the year 2018-19. For this purpose, separate formats for both students and parents were prepared to be filled up. Their rating of the teaching learning process will help us to fill up the lacunae that still persists in education systems. The opinion of the students about the course content as well as syllabus are satisfactory. The interactions of the teachers with students hold

an excellent remark. In regards to other facilities such as health care, canteen, sports, cultural etc. hold a moderate view by the students. However, they are proud of the college and share a good memory after leaving the college. Parents' Feedback: The parent's opinions are almost similar. Most of them are happy to see the student teacher relationship and the fair academic atmosphere prevailing in all the departments of our college. Off course, suggestions and criticisms are always appreciated by our college. A very few parents offer suggestions that are considered seriously and tried to implement in the system. Hope we will do our best to make the educational environment of Guwahati College appreciable in the near future. Analysis of the Students' Feedback Report 1. I. Out of randomized 75 students 61 nos of student rated as extremely good. i.e. most of the students are highly satisfied with the learning value of the department. (learning value in terms of skills, concepts, knowledge, analytical abilities, broadening perspectives etc.) II. Regarding applicability/ relevance to real life situation 27 nos. of students rated extremely good. III. In respect of depth of the course content 38 nos of students rated extremely good. IV. In respect of course content a large nos of students rated as extremely good and very good. V. Regarding extent of effort required by the students more than 67 of students rated extremely good. Students are satisfied as their needs are fulfilled to a higher extent. VI. More than 63 of students supported the relevance of learning value of the project given by the respective departments. VII. The overall rating of the students were quite satisfactory. 2. 84 of students considered the syllabus as adequate and 16 of students rated the syllabus as inadequate. 3. Regarding course 40 students considered relevant and 60 of students termed the course highly relevant. 4. 60 students opined that 75-90 of syllabus was covered during the session . On the other hand the remaining 40 of students rated it as 90-100. 5. More than 53 students considered about the library holding for the course content is excellent. 6. Regarding prescribed readings 63 of the students rated it as good. 7. In terms of internal evaluation system 47 of the students rated it as very good. On the other hand 53 of students considered it as good. 8. 53 students viewed that the total weightage of the course in the internal assessment should be 25. 9. Regarding the fairly operating of internal assessment system , almost all the students agreed

The college has introduced Mentor-Mentee system from 2018 and is continued where a mentor is provided to every semester to look after his or her academic and psychological well being and also monitor class attendance and performance. Under this system the full time teachers of the college have been engaged as mentors of each class. Students of each class of the college are having a full time teacher as a mentor. At the beginning of the academic session the class wise mentor list is displayed in the departmental notice board. The Institution has a good image when it comes to conducting final semester examinations. It gives a good academic atmosphere for the examinees by providing strict vigilance, transparent marking system and quality product. The Institution also emphasizes on all round development of the student's personality by classroom discussion and extracurricular activities.

4.4.2 Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilising physical, academic and support facilities. Maintenance of Campus Facilities: The college has a Maintenance Committee headed by the Principal, monitored by the Office Superintendent and comprising of teaching staff that oversees the maintenance of buildings, classrooms and laboratories. Additionally many divisions have contract with suppliers and private parties the repair and maintenance of college infrastructure. Improvement of the college ambience is given great importance and several initiatives have been taken for the purpose. Periodic painting and whitewashing of walls were undertaken along with tree plantation and ornamental gardening to uphold the green and pristine environment of the college. A block pavement with roof shading connecting the office to the classrooms was constructed to ensure swift and hassle free movement even in rainy days. Most importantly a team of dedicated staff including cleaners, gardeners masons, plumbers etc are employed for the upkeep and service of the existing and upgraded infrastructure regularly. Lab Assistants under the supervision of the HOD s maintain the efficiency of the classrooms, laboratories, library etc. Periodic reporting on requirements of repairs are submitted by the HOD s to the administrative office. The requirements are collectively processed before every semester break and necessary initiative shown to procure the same by the administration. Maintenance of Electrical Equipments: Reputed private parties are given the contract to procure, purchase and monitor all electrical and IT equipments. Repair and replacements are also done from time to time based on complaints and reviews by concerned departments. The teaching and Non-teaching staff are also trained in the basic maintenance of these equipments. Maintenance of Canteen: The canteen committee has been responsible for monitoring the operations of the canteen and

implementing and reviewing the canteen policy including maintenance of hygiene and fair pricing. The committee has also overseen the upgrade of the canteen into separate wings for teachers and students to ensure smooth and happy functioning. The canteen has also increased its strength and capacity to accommodate all events of the college and make the canteen not just an eating space but a forum for exchanging ideas and vibrant conversations.

A 25 KW solar panel was set up, which is being installed in the library block, which provides the electricity requirements for the Main Gate of the College, College Office, around the college play ground. Another panel installed in the campus, has been supplying electricity requirements for running the solar street lights (15 watt LED) in the campus (numbering 20). The total annual conventional electricity power consumption during the assessment year was approximately 65x12 KW. A large number of the rooms in the various blocks of the college are provided with LED lights. As a step towards environmental consciousness, the World Environment Day was observed by the institution.
